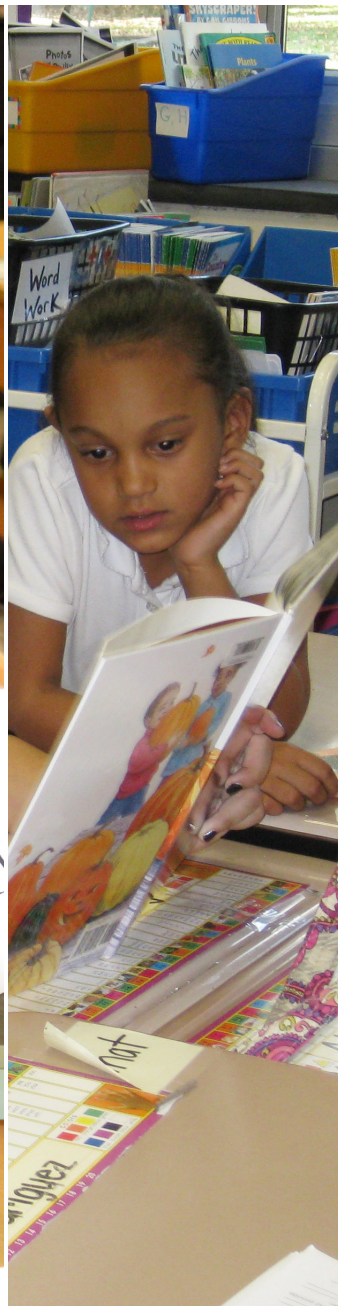

Ready.Set.READ! 2014 Progress Report

A community initiative focused on improving early grade reading proficiency-- the key to academic and future success

Ready.Set.READ! is managed by United Way of Berks County



MISSION: Develop and implement a comprehensive and collaborative system of support throughout Berks County that will ensure reading proficiency for students by the end of third grade.

GOAL: 90% of Berks County 3rd Graders will be proficient readers by 2023, as measured by 3rd Grade PSSA test scores

LEADERSHIP MESSAGE:

The past year has been filled with tremendous growth and commitment as the work of Ready.Set.READ! paves the way for more children to become better readers and ultimately achieve greater success.


In continuing the work of the original Founders Council, a board of directors was established earlier this year to provide direction and chart the course of the work around the initiative's key strategies. The group represents our county's educational and business communities, as well as nonprofit and faith-based organizations. Their dedication to the initiative's mission and work has helped achieve several significant milestones in 2014.

For example, Ready.Set.READ!:

- Developed a strategic plan and key tactics to guide our work.
- Enlisted Capital Area Intermediate Unit to conduct an independent evaluation of the initiative's development.
- Increased community awareness and volunteer recruitment with an advertising campaign in partnership with Reading Eagle Company.
- Received \$165,250 in Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) contributions to invest in school-age literacy programs.

Ready.Set.READ! experienced significant progress around its school-age strategy as partnerships with schools, businesses and volunteers fueled the success around these efforts. Over 300 trained volunteers are now working with close to 450 students in 25 elementary schools within 10 school districts, compared to six districts last year. School administrators, teachers, parents, and students have all shared their excitement around the initiative, noting improved reading skills and the strength of the bond formed between the tutor and student.

We share our gratitude with the hundreds of individuals and organizations that have made these milestones possible, and for helping ignite the joy of reading and learning in children throughout our community. We're very fortunate to have a community that believes in us, supports us, and encourages us. Thank you for being that community and for joining us in our mission. Together, we are making a difference in a child's life.

Reading proficiently is the key to a child's academic and future success. That's why United Way and partners launched Ready.Set.READ! - a community initiative bringing together schools, business, individuals and community organizations to improve early grade reading success.



Early Grade Reading: A Community Focus

Ready.Set.READ! is a community-wide initiative managed by United Way of Berks County that brings together schools, businesses, organizations and individuals to improve early grade reading success. Based on the county-wide 2013 PSSA data, 27% of Berks County third graders were not reading proficiently. The collaborative is working towards the goal of 90% of third-graders in Berks County reading on grade level by 2023, as measured by the third grade PSSA exam.

This collective work concentrates on four implementation strategies:

- Implement school readiness activities for pre-school children
- Provide supplemental support to struggling readers in the early grades
- Engage parents to promote literacy
- Mobilize the community around this effort

Ready.Set.READ! Strategies

Implement school readiness activities for pre-school children

WHY THIS IS IMPORTANT

Quality early care and education settings provide an opportunity to expose young children to learning environments that can help to build their language and literacy development. However, many children either aren't able to take advantage of those programs or attend low quality programs instead.

Ready. Set. READ! is committed to developing strategies to expand access to quality early learning experiences for children that help prepare them to learn to read when they enter school.

HOW WE'RE MAKING A DIFFERENCE:

Story Friends are corporate and community volunteers who read to children in Head Start and Pennsylvania Pre-K Counts classrooms once a month. This group of volunteers helps three to five year olds develop a love of books and reading. They also model how to read with fluency and expression. Fourteen corporate and community volunteers participated in the pilot from January to May 2014. This fall, the number of volunteers has increased to 41, and the program is expanding into child care centers as well.

Growing Readers is a new approach being implemented to provide early literacy support to several Latino operated childcare centers in the city of Reading providing care to children 3-5 years of age. To be eligible for the support, these centers must be participating in the Pennsylvania Keystone STARS program at a STAR 1 or 2 level. The child care center director and teachers will receive support in strengthening their preschool curriculum to meet the state 2014 Learning Standards for Early Childhood. Outcomes include children entering kindergarten with the foundational skills needed to succeed in school.

Provide supplemental support to struggling readers in the early grades

WHY THIS IS IMPORTANT

Children who encounter challenges in learning to read once they enter school are especially vulnerable to never catching up. Schools and classroom teachers work hard to identify those children and intervene as early and as much as possible. However, one of the most basic strategies is providing extra time for children to practice reading with the guidance of a supportive adult. This simple strategy provides the perfect opportunity to call the community to action to volunteer by spending an hour a week with a child encouraging them to read.

HOW WE'RE MAKING A DIFFERENCE:



Star Readers expanded significantly during the past year thanks to the support and involvement of dedicated volunteers. Over 300 trained volunteers, including corporate employees, college students, retired educators and community volunteers are demonstrating tremendous dedication by providing supplemental reading instruction to close to 450 first, second and third grade students within 10 school districts to boost their reading comprehension, accuracy, fluency and literacy skills.

Did you know children can lose up to three months of academic progress over the summer?

Ready.Set.READ! partnered with Birdsboro Community Memorial Center and Olivet Boys & Girls Club of Reading & Berks County to implement two summer reading programs. More than 150 kids participated in Birdsboro's Camp Adventure to maintain and improve reading skills over the summer months. Through activities centered on literacy activities, Readers Theatre performances and reading to pets, 65% of the participants maintained or improved their reading fluency. Over 250 kids in second through fifth grades joined the Olivet's Bookworms program and read a wide variety of literature and reenacted favorite chapters to increase vocabulary and fluency.

2013-14 Star Readers EVALUATION

Year Two Progress:

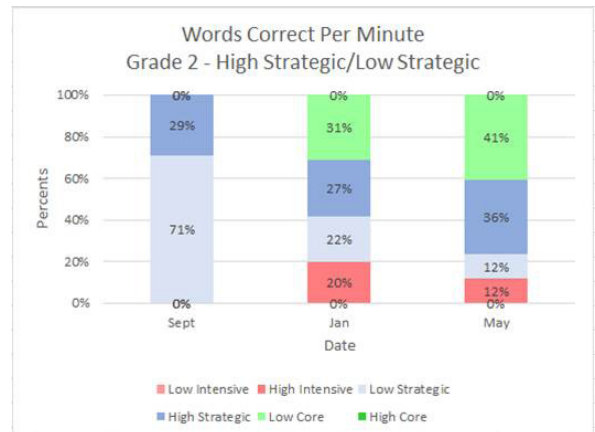
Capital Area Intermediate Unit was once again engaged to conduct an independent evaluation of the Star Readers program in the 2013-14 school year. Each participating school conducted assessments of tutored students using the DIBELS assessment indicators, at the beginning of the school year, mid-year and end of the year. Students were assessed on Fluency, which is the rate of students' reading (words correct per minute) and Accuracy which assesses students' reading errors. Assessment scores are then categorized into three levels: Core, Strategic or Intensive, with the score ranges for each category increasing over the course of the school year.

A total of 252 students were assessed over the entire school year and were therefore included in the full evaluation report. The target group for participation in Star Readers was 2nd Grade students assessed as Strategic in the beginning of the year. This was the group of students that saw the greatest improvement in their DIBELS assessment, with nearly half of them reaching the Core level by the end of the year.

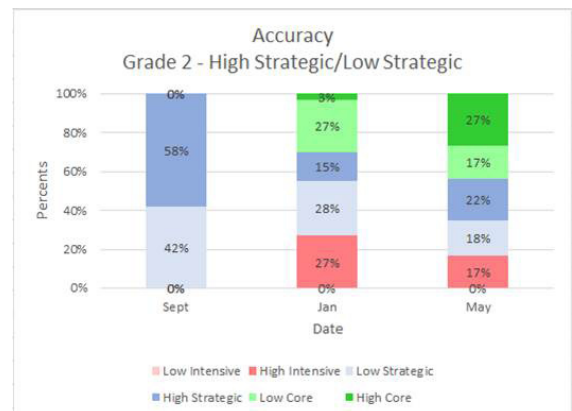
Additional goals for the 2014-15 Star Readers evaluation is to compare the growth in DIBELS scores of tutored students to similarly assessed non-participating students and track PSSA 3rd Grade Reading test scores for tutored students.

Engage parents to promote literacy

WHY THIS IS IMPORTANT



Parents and families have a critical role in helping children develop their language and literacy skills, starting at birth. Helping children build their vocabulary by talking to them about everyday tasks and experiences, and telling stories and sharing books builds an interest and excitement of reading. These are just some of the simple things that parents can do to help children be prepared to learn to read . . . if they know the importance of these activities and have the knowledge and resources to put them into practice.



Raising a Reader is an evidence-based early literacy and family engagement program that helps families develop, practice and sustain home literacy routines with their children, aged 0-8 years old. Each week children bring home a bright red book bag filled with several high quality, culturally and linguistically appropriate books. The bags are exchanged each week so that over the course of a year, families will get the opportunity to read over 100 books together.

Ready. Set. READ! will partner with 10th & Green and 16th & Haak Elementary Schools in the Reading School District to provide Raising A Reader to nearly 400 children in their Pre-K and Kindergarten classrooms, starting in January.

HOW WE'RE MAKING A DIFFERENCE:

Abriendo Puertas/Opening Doors is a nationally recognized 10-session group education program for parents of children 0-5 years old. It is designed to help them understand the importance of their role as their child's first teacher and increase their child's school readiness. Developed in California, especially for Latino parents, it also helps them learn how to best support their child's educational progress.



Centro Hispano has partnered with Ready. Set. READ! to take the lead in offering the program to Berks County parents. Centro Hispano staff have been certified as Opening Doors trainers and are working closely with the BCIU Head Start program, to train Parent Outreach staff and to support them in facilitation classes for Head Start parents. Plans for the future also include training personnel from churches and other community-based organizations to offer the program to their members and clients.

Mobilize the community

WHY THIS IS IMPORTANT

Reading is a critical bridge to success in school, work and life. Children learn to read until third grade, and by fourth grade they read to learn. Students who don't read well have challenges with grades, disengaging from school and at greater risk of dropping out of school. The issue of reading proficiency is one for the community to rally around, as the issue is at the heart of our county's future.

HOW WE'RE MAKING A DIFFERENCE:

Hundreds of Ready.Set.READ! supporters and volunteers shared their caring spirit to make the past year a success. Organizations conducted book drives for local child care, school and youth programs. And, great strides were made in raising awareness about the importance of this issue and recruiting additional tutors to support the work of the initiative. Berks Countians continue to step up to the plate to make a difference as they recognize the need and importance of this work in the lives of children, families and our community.



Ready.Set.READ! celebrated its first year of work and achievements at a community forum in 2013. Ralph Smith, senior vice president, Annie E. Casey Foundation and managing director for the National Campaign on Grade Level Reading, commended the initiative's efforts and emphasized the continued crucial need to implement programs and to work with community partners to improve literacy and reading proficiency of pre-school and elementary school students.

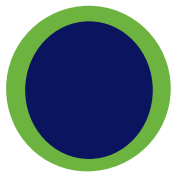
