In 2012, Ready. Set. READ! announced its bold goal - - 90% of Berks County 3rd Graders will be proficient readers by 2023, as measured by 3rd Grade PSSA Test Scores. In 2013 and 2014, RSR started to see progress in engaging the community, building partnerships and developing programs to work towards this bold goal. This past year, Ready. Set. READ! built momentum in programs in each strategy area which we are excited to share throughout this report.

What's New and Exciting With Our Programs?

- Star Readers: Volunteers are currently tutoring in 12 school districts and 29 elementary schools providing one on one tutoring support to students each week. We have a total of 376 active tutors who make this possible.
- **Raising A Reader:** After piloting this program in Pre-K and Kindergarten classrooms in two Reading schools last year, it's been expanded to two more elementary schools and a Head Start site in Reading.
- **ReadyRosie:** As a parent engagement resource, ReadyRosie is currently engaging parents in nine schools districts.
- **Growing Readers:** Growing Readers helped seven childcare teachers increase the quality of their program for the 62 children in their care.
- Story Friends: Story Friends grew from 14 volunteers to 85 volunteers.
- **Neighborhood Bridges:** RSR began a partnership with Yocum Institute to pilot this program in four third grade classrooms in two elementary schools in the Reading School District.

Looking Towards the Future. Along with the initiative's success, come challenges. With the recent changes in the PSSA's, we recognize schools and students are adjusting to a new testing structure. While these changes will initially impact assessment levels, our commitment to Ready. Set. READ!'s goal and mission remains steadfast.

Ready. Set. READ! will continue its commitment to help kids become better readers and help put young students on track for a brighter future. In 2016, RSR will continue to identify additional proven programs and engage more partners. Additionally, our commitment is to secure additional data and provide more comprehensive and thorough outcomes within each strategic priority.

Thank You! It is only with the dedication and hard work of all of our volunteers – board members, corporate and community partners, volunteer tutors and others – that more children enjoy reading, increase their reading proficiency and are on the path to greater achievements. We are very fortunate to have a strong community that not only believes in the RSR mission but steps up to play key roles in achieving it.

READY.SET.READ!

MISSION: Develop and implement a comprehensive and collaborative system of support throughout Berks County that will ensure reading proficiency for students by the end of third grade.

GOAL: To have 90% of Berks County third graders proficient readers by 2023, as measured by third grade PSSA scores.

STRATEGIES: Ready.Set.READ! has identified five overriding strategies to implement in its efforts to fulfill the mission and achieve our goal.

- 1. Infrastructure
- 2. Birth to Pre-Kindergarten Children
- 3. School Age Students
- 4. Parent & Family
- 5. Community Engagement

Early grade reading success is a critical component of learning and a leading indicator of future academic and educational success. Yet 40% of third-graders throughout Berks County are reading below grade level. That means that over 1,900 children in our community - in urban, rural and suburban schools - are four times more likely to drop out of school and 13 times more likely to drop out if they also live in poverty. They are less likely to develop skills essential for contributing to the 21st Century economy and less likely to be effective citizens.

GUIDING PRINCIPLES

- All children can learn and succeed.
- Parents and/or primary caregivers are the first and most important teachers of their children.
- Our children's success depends on a focused, collaborative effort by parents, schools, universities/colleges, government, nonprofit organizations, faith-based groups and public and private businesses.
- Early literacy development is critical to lifelong learning, success and personal fulfillment.

BIRTH TO PRE-K

STRATEGY:

Ready. Set. READ! will support language and pre-literacy development in young children.



Story FRIENDS provides an opportunity for corporate and community volunteers to help preschool children develop a love of books and reading. In addition, when adults read aloud to children they model how to read with fluency and expression. Story Friends volunteers read a preselected book to children in a preschool classroom one time a month.

After a brief orientation, volunteers spend approximately thirty minutes each month reading and conversing with a group of children in a preschool program from October to April. In select programs, the volunteers also read during the month of May.

STORY FRIENDS RESULTS

- Story Friends volunteers increased from 40 to 85 in the past year
- 1,064 children benefited from 2,990 hours of reading time with their volunteers
- 1,154 new books were distributed to children and classrooms



GROWING READERS is a collaborative partnership with Latino childcare providers to develop and/or enhance research-sound teacher practices, recognizing the importance of providing a language rich environment and increasing the quality of conversation with children, in order to lay the foundation for the development of necessary literacy skills to ensure future reading success.

The program is made up of 12 weeks of individual teacher support by providing weekly literacy planning and materials, modeling and coaching. This includes demonstrating how practices should be implemented, weekly teacher observation, weekly coaching session, and ongoing coaching upon program completion.

GROWING READERS RESULTS

- 75% of teachers found children were more engaged in reading
- 100% of teachers found the program helpful to have a coach come in daily to implement the program

SCHOOL AGE

STRATEGY:

Ready. Set. READ! will provide supplemental support to students (grades k-3) struggling to be proficient readers.



STAR READERS was established to mobilize community and volunteer resources to supplement reading instructional activities of schools, by providing one-on-one tutoring support for early grade students to improve their reading skills.

Star Readers is designed to serve those students who are reading just below grade level. The hypothesis of this program (based on best practices and research) is that with some extra one-on one or two-on-one practice from a community volunteer these students will advance faster than they otherwise would have without a tutor. It was not designed to replace school-based interventions nor is it a program for the lowest achieving students.

Star Readers significantly expanded last year and is now established in 29 elementary schools in 12 school districts, thanks to the support of the community, volunteers and school districts. Nearly 400 trained

volunteers, includes corporate employees, college students, retired educators and community volunteers provide instruction to nearly 500 first, second and third graders.

In the formal evaluation of Star Readers this past year, conducted by Dr. Chrystine Mitchell and Lucretia Brown, several positive findings about its impact on tutored students were identified. DIBELS Next assessment data, measuring students' Fluency (words per minute) and Accuracy, were collected throughout the year for all students who were tutored, as well as for similar non-participating students to allow comparisons. Satisfaction surveys were also completed by students, parents, tutors and school coordinators.

STAR READERS RESULTS

- Tutored students saw a statistically significant increase in Fluency at year-end compared to non-participating students
- 74% of tutored students had a 30-point increase in Fluency, which is greater growth than typically expected
- 30% of students who began the year at the lowest level (Intensive) for Accuracy at the beginning of the year, moved into the middle level (Strategic) and 17% increased to the top level (Benchmark)
- Over 90% of students said they had a positive experience and believed it positively influenced their reading ability
- Over 82% of parents reported their child's attitude toward reading improved

THE IMPACT OF PSSA CHANGES

With the recent adoption of the PA Common Core Standards, the annual Pennsylvania System of State Assessment (PSSA) tests were revised and utilized for the first time in Spring, 2015.

The PSSA test that assesses language and literacy skills is first given in Third Grade, and the new test was designed to be in alignment with the new standards and included increased writing elements. The state adopted these standards in 2013 in an effort to teach and measure more complex 21st-century skills, such as problem-solving and critical thinking. The tests are also heavier on writing. The "cut scores," or passing levels, were changed significantly to reflect the new test. As a result, it was predicted that PSSA scores would significantly drop across the state, which is what happened. The state Department of Education has indicated that the 2015 scores should be viewed as the new baseline for future comparison purposes.

How did Berks County Third Grade students perform on the 2015 PSSA English Language Arts test? Unfortunately, across the county, only 60% of all students scored as Proficient or better, which represents a 10% decrease from the previous year. The 40% who tested as being below Proficient, represented over 1900 students.

Ready. Set. READ! recognizes the greater challenge that it faces to achieve its goal of 90% Proficiency by 2023. However, it believes the current programs and activities that it has initiated since 2012 have had positive impact on participants. RSR will continue to partner with school districts to support struggling readers and will increase its efforts to support children and families from birth. Collectively, given enough time, all of the community's efforts will ultimately produce early grade reading success for children in Berks County.

MINI GRANTS AWARDED

For a second year, United Way made \$500 mini grants available to educators at elementary schools that partner with Ready. Set READ! to offer the Star Readers tutoring program. Educators at all 29 elementary schools that currently host Star Readers tutors were invited to submit grant applications for literacy based projects.

31 proposals from 14 schools, received funding totaling \$14,596 from this opportunity. The school districts benefiting include: Antietam School District, Brandywine Height Area School District, Conrad Weiser School District, Daniel Boone Area School District, Governor Mifflin School District, Oley Valley School District, Reading School District, and Schuylkill Valley School District.

Neighborhood Bridges

During the 2015-2016 school year, RSR is partnering with Yocum Institute to pilot this program to four 3rd grade classrooms at both 16th& Haak and 13th & Green Elementary Schools Based on midyear evaluations, 83% of teachers strongly agreed this program has benefited their students and would like Neighborhood Bridges to return to their classroom in future years.

PARENTS & FAMILY

STRATEGY:

Ready. Set. READ! will support parents and other caregivers to help children develop, read and learn.

READYROSIE

ReadyRosie is an online parent engagement tool, created to give parents and guardians easy ideas of how to better engage their young children. Every day they receive an email or text with a video in English and Spanish, showing real families modeling ways to incorporate learning at home, in the library, in the car, at the grocery store, or wherever the day takes them!

The most effective forms of parent involvement are those which engage parents working directly with their children on learning activities at home. Nearly 80-90% of young parents access the internet once a day, everyday. ReadyRosie was created to help schools and communities deepen and scale their early childhool parent engagmenet efforts by leveraging the power of video modeling and mobile technology to meet and equip parents where they are.

READYROSIE RESULTS

• Through partnerships with nine schools districts, ReadyRosie is currently engaging 1,537 parents and 1,977 children



Raising A Reader (RAR) is an evidence-based early literacy and family engagement program that helps families develop, practice and sustain home literacy routines. More than twenty independent evaluations indicate significant improvements in family reading behaviors and school readiness across children from diverse socioeconomic, cultural and language backgrounds after participating in RAR.

Last year, RAR was initiated in pre-kindergarten and kindergarten classrooms at 16th & Haak and 10th & Green schools in Reading. With positive findings from the pilot, RAR is now implemented in two new schools, Glenside and Millmont Elementary schools, and Glenside Head Start, starting February 2016.

RAISING A READER RESULTS

- Families in pre-kindergarten and kindergarten classrooms in the initial two elementary schools increased the frequency of their book sharing time as well as the length of time spent reading books each week
- 24% increase in children asking parents to read books three or more times per week
- 37% increase in families spending fifteen or more minutes each time reading books
- 75% of parents now ask children questions about the story when reading





ABRIENDO PUERTAS/OPENING DOORS



Abriendo Puertas/Opening Doors is a nationally recognized 10-session group education program for parents of children 0-5 years old, to help them understand the importance of their role as their child's first teacher and increase their child's school readiness. Developed in California, specifically for Latino parents, it also helps them learn to be their child's advocate once they start their formal education.

As certified Opening Doors trainers, Centro Hispano staff has facilitated several programs in the community for parents of young children. They have also trained staff from other community organizations so they can host education classes to parents they're connected with.

REACH OUT AND READ



Reach Out and Read (ROAR) was developed by pediatricians and early childhood educators who recognized that growing up healthy means growing up with books.

A national, nonprofit, school readiness organization since 1989, ROAR builds on the unique relationship between doctors and patients to spread the message that reading aloud is the most important thing parents can do to help their children love books and start school ready to learn.

• At every checkup, doctors and nurses encourage parents to read aloud to their young children.

• During the checkup, every child between the ages of 6 months and 5 years is given a brand-new, developmentally-appropriate book to take home.

In Berks County, there are currently three pediatric practices that proudly participate in ROAR. Ready. Set. READ! hopes to add other health care providers to this list, and has provided grants to some of the current sites to assist in their purchasing books to distribute to children. In addition, RSR volunteers have occasionally spent time reading to children in the waiting room.

REACH OUT AND READ RESULTS

Doctors and nurses at Reach Out and Read sites in Berks County distributed 20, 000 new books to young children at their well-child visits last year.

- **OPENING DOOR RESULTS**
 - 22 new community facilitators were trained to deliver the program to parents
 - 45 parents, with 96 young children, have graduated from 10-week parent education classes
 - Parents reported a 77% increase in their ability to teach language to their children
 - Parents also reported a 60% increase in their understanding of the importance of reading to their children

COMMUNITY

STRATEGY:

Ready. Set. READ! will mobilize the community to take action to improve early grade reading success in Berks County.

VOLUNTEER ENGAGEMENT

Hundreds of Ready. Set. READ! supporters, volunteers and companies share their caring spirit to make this initiative successful. Organizations conducted book drives for local child care, school and youth programs. In total, we have approximately 689 active volunteers. More specifically, with the Star Reader's program, we have 376 active tutors who make this program possible. Of that group, 27% are from the corporate sector and an additional 36% are volunteers from the community. Martha Goldstein from UGIES states why she continues to support the program: "This experience is so satisfying helping students on their journey. The children are great!"

2nd Annual RSR Community Breakfast and Forum

In December, 2014, we again held a breakfast event to report on the progress RSR had made in its second year of activities and thank those who played key roles. Over 150 people attended to hear from RSR volunteer and staff leaders, who focused on the tremendous growth the initiative experienced in the previous year. Our keynote speaker was Bill Isler, President and CEO of the Fred Rogers Company and a recognized state and national advocate for quality early childhood learning programs. He applauded our community for its support of RSR, reinforced the importance of its mission and shared his thoughts on the critical need for RSR to continue its focus on helping children be better prepared to learn to read when they start school.


Celebrate RSR with the Fightin Phils!
